



Hello you All!!!

I believe Psalm 1 is a poem that invites us to see our lives through a healthier lens. To delight in a better narrative. The invitation is good, friends. And the story only gets better. Every living thing has a story to tell. *Literally*!

DNA reads like a script of sequential building blocks and is found in the cells of every creature on the planet. And they are constantly determined to tell this story. The flower's objective when offering nectar resembles the bee's reasoning for carrying it back to the hive, which mirrors the bear's motive for making a meal of the hive, mating, and feeding her cubs. They all have an instinctual desire to pass on their genetic code. To tell their story, even if only biologically. It's as if the *Creator of Life* considers himself an author and has hardwired storytelling into the DNA of creation.

As image-bearers of this Creator God, humans are uniquely drawn to stories. The words "once upon a time" or "in the beginning" unlock a sense of wonder and curiosity in us. We gravitate toward characters we see ourselves in and live in search of our own happily ever after. Simply put, we are creatures of story.

The question is: Which one?

The word Torah means "*teaching*" or "*instruction*." But it's also commonly used to refer to the origin story of God's covenantal relationship with the people of Israel outlined in the first five books of the Hebrew Bible. That said, Psalm 1 is a pronouncement of blessings to those who delight in the wisdom and commands of Yahweh. But also, those who delight in His story. More pointedly, who delight in letting God *be the one* who defines our narratives day and night. Some people have an aversion to the language of "*blessing*" in Scripture, for fear of the pitfalls of prosperity gospel theology. But Psalm 1, much like the Sermon on the Mount, is an invitation to rethink what we define as *blessing* - and what we believe its source is.

In Matthew 6:22–23, Jesus says: "The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are healthy, your whole body will be full of light. But if your eyes are unhealthy, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light within you is darkness, how great is that darkness!"

I believe Jesus wants to give us healthier eyes to see what blessings are. If the lens that we see the world through is the story of God, blessings are not simple treasures that make us prosperous by cultural standards. Rather, blessings are the gifts that make our stories look more like His. (continued from page 1)

Through this perspective, faith becomes actively choosing to make God's story our own. Sin is consciously removing God from being the main character of our story. The curse, or

consequences of our sin, is that our stories look less like His. And the gospel is the work Christ has done to bring our stories back into alignment with the story of God.

As a seamstress and crafter, I used to think of my creativity as an offering to God. A thing that, if I worked hard enough at it, He might be impressed with. But the more I have been delighting in the story of God, the more I realize that good and perfect gifts are not given to the Father of lights. *They come from him!* And each is an invitation to redefine not only what we think about blessings, but who we believe is the source of them.

If we are the main characters of our stories, then we must be the source of our own goodness. We must manage to be the heroes of our own tale, while also being the author and finisher of our own fate.

But Scripture suggests that we are but characters in a bigger narrative, one that centers around a good and loving Father.

This month of September – is the kick-off for us to continue God's story – sharing it with others in our congregation and outside of it. J.A.M. and Confirmation is all about teaching and instruction for our kiddos – and Adult Bible Studies are about continuing that learning process for us adults.

As I said earlier, I believe Psalm 1 is a poem that invites us to see our lives through a healthier lens. I believe that we can all find delight in a better narrative. Remember, the story only gets better – and you are part of the story.



Treasurer's Report: Shelley Wiese

All bills and apportionments are paid to date

Our expenses are exceeding our income (giving). We are behind \$28,700.

Trustees Report: Mark Wiese

Met on July 10 and August 14

- July Meeting Jer's Electric installed a breaker panel in basement \$4,160, Painting was done in the upper hallway cost \$320. Lightening took out a fuse in the elevator panel that MEI had to replace \$1,107. During the heavy rain in June the boiler room and elevator shaft flooded. Both sump pumps burned out and found out the discharge pipe for the sump pump in the boiler room was plugged with some kind of shale. Also took out the water heater. Quist Plumbing came to help pump the water out and temporarily reroute the sump pump and replace the water heater. Cost of water heater \$1,259 and two sump pumps \$822.
- August Meeting Church cleaning is moved to September 9 due to Labor Day holiday. The flooring in upper hallway is done - \$6,570. East and west stairways will be finished soon. Looking at ways to get the water out of the sump pump hole in the boiler room. Peter will set up something for removal of aluminum cans to Marshall recycling. Discussed ways to keep semi-trucks out and off the parking lot. Discussion was to put up a sign in the middle of the north entrance.
