



Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ –

How is it with your soul?

For the past four weeks we have been talking about our souls. That internal part of us that cannot be found on a slide under a microscope or on an x-ray, a sonogram, a MRI or even a full body ultrasound or scan. *"Scientifically,"* or medically - there is no evidence that we have a soul. But we talk about souls all the time, not so much in church – but we say things such as:

Well - bless your soul!
Not a living soul.....
He or she is an old soul.
Well – that's/there's a lost soul.
Bare one's soul.
Sell one's soul.....
The eyes are the gateway to the soul.
May God rest his or her soul.....

And also, when an airline crew - pilot, captain and flight attendants – get ready for departure from a terminal – they ask how many *"souls"* are onboard in the event that tragedy should strike. The counting of souls goes back to the Book of Acts of the Apostles when the Apostle Paul is involved in a shipwreck, and he writes in Acts 27:37 – *"all 276 of the souls who were on board..."*

In the past, I engaged in a Bible study by Presbyterian Pastor John Ortberg and the Bible Study he wrote called *"Soul Keeping."* What was shared and what I learned in this Bible study has never left me. *We* – each of individually - is responsible for our own soul. No one else. Pastor Ortberg was struggling with a few of his own demons in his life, so he sought out a renown professor from University of South California, a professor of philosophy, Dallas Willard. Written in the forward of this Bible study, Pastor Ortberg shares this quote from Dallas Willard, and I have never forgotten it: *"The most important thing in your life, is not what you do; it's who you become. That's what you will take into eternity. (WOW! My emphasis.) You are an unceasing spiritual being with an eternal destiny in God's great universe. That's the most important thing for you to know about you. Your soul is not just something that lives on after your body dies. It's the most important thing about you. It is your life."*

Beginning all the way back in the Old Testament it first speaks about the soul in Genesis 2:7, where God forms man from dust – and breathes life into him, making him a "living soul" (or "living being" in modern translations). Our soul is what connects our thoughts, our sensations, our emotions, and our will – integrating them into an entire being. It is what makes you who you are. And each of us is the keepers of our own soul, and we, each of us, is responsible for nourishing our own soul. In Psalm 84, the psalmist speaks to how our soul longs to be with God, our Creator, and then the blessings that come to those *"whose hearts and souls are set on this pilgrimage, here on earth."* Check it out.

I hope you are enjoying this series and learning about your soul. We will continue this series until the Season of Lent begins. Hard to believe that Ash Wednesday will arrive on February 18. That will be here before we know it! During the Lenten season we will be looking at the conversations that lead to the cross.



Love Wrapped In Action

This Advent season, **Peace United Methodist Church** was given a quiet but powerful opportunity to live out the heart of the Gospel—not just in one moment, but through many quiet acts of love.

We learned about two teenagers—a girl and a boy—who attend the local Alternative School. Through caring staff, it became clear that their family was likely unable to afford Christmas gifts this year. Like many families facing hardship, their need wasn't loudly announced, but it was deeply real.

In response, two members of Peace UMC did what Christians have done for generations: they went shopping.

With care and intention, gifts were chosen to say *you matter*. We thought about what might bring joy, what would help these young people feel seen and valued during a season that can be especially difficult for those who feel overlooked. Along with the gifts, a Christmas meal was also provided for each family, offering not only presents under the tree but nourishment, warmth, and the reassurance that they would not be alone on Christmas. The spirit of generosity extended even further through the faithful work of the **Peace Quilters**, a quilt and fleece blanket were also gifted to both young people offering warmth and comfort during the cold winter months.

In addition, quilts and fleece blankets were donated to the Kiwanis and Family Services for distribution through Pipestone County, reaching individuals and families throughout our community.

Scripture calls us to this kind of love. Jesus teaches us plainly:

“For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat... Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.” Matthew 25:35, 40

Caring for those who have less isn't optional in the Christian life, it is central to it. Proverbs reminds us:

“Whoever is kind to the poor lends to the Lord, and He will reward them for what they have done.” Proverbs 19:17

These simple acts of generosity reflect who we strive to be at Peace UMC: a church that notices, a church that responds, and a church that loves. In moments like these, we are reminded that ministry doesn't always happen in pews or sanctuaries, it often happens through sewing hands, shopping carts, shared meals, and open hearts.

Thank you to all who support the mission and outreach of Peace United Methodist Church through prayers, generosity, and faithful service. If you become aware of a family or individual in our community who may need help, we ask you to bring it to the attention of Pastor Velda. Together, we can continue to be the hands and feet of Christ, responding with care when God places a need before us.

May this story encourage each of us to stay attentive to where God is calling us to serve next. Sometimes the most sacred moments happen quietly, when love shows up and says, “*You are not forgotten.*”

Prayer Shawls are also given out at the Relay for Life Event and to the clients at New Life Treatment Center in Woodstock as they complete their treatment program.

Whether they are called Prayer Shawls, Comfort Shawls, Peace Shawls, or Mantles, etc., the shawl maker begins with prayers and blessings for the recipient. The intentions are continued throughout the creation of the shawl. Upon completion, a final blessing is offered before the shawl is sent on its way. Some recipients have continued the kindness by making a shawl and passing it onto someone in need. Thus, the blessing ripples from person-to-person, with both the giver and receiver feeling the unconditional embrace of a sheltering God!
