



Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

It is hard to believe that I am writing this article for our November Newsletter! The holidays are just right around the corner and then a new year begins – again!!! And when I think about the month of November, of course, Thanksgiving comes to mind which always leads me to consider what am I grateful for – because you need to be grateful before you can be thankful. Were you aware of that fact?

During the month of November, I will be leading a series on being happy with what you have. And asking the question - Is what you have - *Enough* for you?

One of Jesus' great teaching parables involves a sower who is casting seeds along the ground. The one sowing the seeds hopes the seeds will sprout, grow and bear good fruit. Some seeds did just that, producing a great harvest. But others, Jesus said, fell among thorns and, though they began to grow, these good plants were quickly choked out. Jesus said the thorns were "the cares of the world and the lure of wealth." (Matthew 13:22)

In our current culture, where having "enough" seems to have become a never-ending pursuit, Jesus' parable remains incredibly relevant. Many of us are chasing the American dream in ways that lead to stress, anxiety, and fear – thorns that can rob us of the ability to enjoy the abundant lives of purpose that God intended for us.

In American today, the average graduate leaves college owing more than \$40,000 in student loan debt. The average U.S. household carries credit card debt in excess of \$16,000. The average American spends 25 percent of their income on housing. The average new car loan is \$42,000 with a payment of \$500 or more a month. All of these amounts are at record highs. Among working-age families, the median amount that American have set aside for retirement is roughly only \$5,000.

Given such numbers, it is not surprising that more than half of Americans are worried they won't be able to maintain their standard of living, and nearly two-thirds fear they won't have enough money for retirement. It's little wonder that nearly half of Americans say they suffer from financial stress because their monthly expenses equal or exceed their income. It's not difficult then to understand why one of the leading causes of relationship stress and divorce is finances.

This series is an invitation for us collectively as a congregation, a faith family, to rediscover truths, drawn from Scripture, that previous generations knew: We find joy and fulfillment in simplicity, relationships, a clear sense of purpose, generosity, and faith. These are the keys to experiencing - the good life.

There is no sin in having wealth. Money itself is morally neutral. It can be used for good or evil. Much of the problem with wealth arises when we make the desire for more – more money and material possessions – a driving focus in our lives. That is the patch of thorns we must avoid.

The New Testament authors, writing in Greek, regularly used the word *metanoia*. The word is typically translated as "repentance." It literally means a change of thinking (values, ideals, understanding) that leads to a change of heart, and ultimately to a change in one's behavior. We all struggle to a degree with wanting more, but in this series that we will experience *metanoia* – that we will see our material wealth with new eyes and come to be seized by the truth Jesus taught in Luke 12:15: "One's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions."

Paul wrote to the Corinthians that God is able to bless us with all that we need so that we "may share abundantly in every good work." (2 Corinthians 9:8) John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, echoed Paul's teaching when he urged Christians to make and save all they can through honest and honorable means – so they can give all they can.

When we choose to believe that life does not consist in the abundance of our possessions, but is found in relationships, in our faith, and in living purposeful lives, we become like the seed that fell on good soil. We become liberated to live the life that God intends for us.

In all that you have and receive – which comes from God above – be grateful – be thankful. Blessings,

Did you know that at any given moment, our Pipetone Sheriff's Department, Fire Department, and Social Services agency carry handmade fleece blankets from Peace Quilters in their vehicles, ready to distribute to those in need? Did you know that our handmade quilts and blankets are donated to Kiwanis, who share them with those in need at the Pipestone County Christmas Care Distribution Day? Did you know that our handmade quilts and blankets are generously donated to Native American students by the Flandreau Indian School Chaplaincy Program, through FIS Chaplain, Pastor Bill Britton? Did you know that each year, we send numerous handmade flannel diapers, receiving blankets, school bags, and children's outfits to Midwest Missions? Did you know that oven mitts and supply bags are sewn and donated to Solar Oven Partners? Did you know each year we donate blankets and quilts to Sleep Tight Pipestone? These efforts reflect our commitment to community support and outreach.

From the Peace Quilters crafting the above items, our parish collecting items for our local school, our support of New Life Treatment Center, our meaningful contributions at Sally's House, and our two days spent with Solar Oven Partners in Raymond, SD, our small but mighty church made a significant impact! A heartfelt thank you to everyone who contributed!

As United Methodists, we are blessed to come together in faith under the auspices of a Church that prioritizes missions. We are fortunate to have outstanding organizations within our United Methodist framework, such as Global Ministries (www.umcmission.org). This organization offers numerous ministries and outreach programs that we as Methodists can support around the clock.

You might think, "I'm not called to be a missionary." So we ask, is mission volunteering limited to certain individuals? No, mission volunteering is a calling for everyone to reflect the light of Christ to others. 
Opportunities to Serve
